Mr. Meier currently serves as the senior civilian adviser to the Army Judge Advocate General on matters related to the Law of Armed Conflict (LOAC). He advises on legal and policy issues involving LOAC, reviews proposed new weapons and weapons systems, serves as a member of the DoD Law of War Working Group, and provides assistance on detainee and Enemy Prisoner of War affairs. Mr. Meier is also an adjunct professor of law at Georgetown University where he teaches courses on LOAC and as a lecturer at the NATO School in Oberammergau, Germany.

Mr. Meier previously served as an Attorney-Adviser with the Office of the Legal Adviser for Political-Military Affairs, U.S. Department of State, from June 2009 until June 2016. Mr. Meier served almost 23 years as an Army Judge Advocate from 1986 until his retirement as a Colonel in August 2009. Mr. Meier earned a B.B.A. degree from Midwestern State University, a J.D. degree from the St. Mary's University, a LL.M. from Georgetown University, a LL.M. in Military Law from The Judge Advocate General's School, and a M.S. in Strategic Studies from the United States Army War College.
